VIP's—Take Note!

The finish line for the current 4-H Year is in sight! While we are waiting on the final details to roll out with all the 4-H Online enrollment, I want you all to start thinking about the VIPs.

Returning Volunteers

At this time, it appears returning volunteers will need to complete the renewal paperwork and update their 4-H online account AFTER October 1st. All returning volunteer will have to go through a criminal background check and Child Abuse Neglect Registry Check. We will let everyone know when we are ready to start that process.

New Volunteers

New volunteers will they be required to have a background check BEFORE conducting any activities with you, they will also be required to participate in a face to face interview with their community club leader.

This new process is not speedy. This year as volunteers went through the process, we found out that paper work on the State side is taking at least 4 weeks to process as compared to what they originally thought would only take 2 weeks. Community Leaders, please keep this in mind as you go through the process of identifying volunteers to lead project meetings, etc. This is going to take some time. The sooner you start identifying them, the sooner we can start getting them through the process. New volunteers will also be required to set up and create a 4-H Online account.

Junior Leaders, Ambassadors & 4-H Camp Counselors

All Junior Leaders, Ambassadors and potential camp counselors will need to fill out the VIP paperwork AND complete the Child Abuse Neglect Registry Check. The Child Abuse check is required to be completed every year.

Hunter Education

Hunter Education Field Day - September 12

Pre-Enrollment is REQUIRED. This is an internet assisted Hunter Education Course. September 12 is the field day for the course.

Check-in is from 7:30 am to 8:00 am. Class starts at 8:00 am and will end at about 3:30 pm. There will be a lunch break from about 11:30 am to 12:30pm.

You must have access to a computer AND a printer in order to complete the online portion of an Internet-Assisted course.

DO NOT REGISTER FOR AN INTERNET-ASSISTED COURSE IF YOU DO NOT HAVE ACCESS TO A COMPUTER AND A PRINT-ER!

This independent study method, a three-part process, requires pre-registration in an Internetassisted Field Day and Testing Session, completion of the

Kansas online hunter education course AND active participation in an Internet-assisted Hunter Education Field Day and Testing Session.

DO NOT TAKE THE ONLINE COURSE UN-TIL YOU HAVE PRE-REGISTERED FOR THE INTERNET-ASSISTED HUNTER EDUCA-TION FIELD DAY AND TESTING SESSION OF YOUR CHOICE. Call 316-321-9660 to Pre-Register and to get additional instructions.

Rifle and Archery Projects

Basic Rifle and Archery classes begin in September and will meet weekly through Thanksgiving. Rifle starts on Tuesday evening, Sept. 8, and Archery starts on Thursday evening, Sept. 10. Check-in is from 6:30 to 7pm and the classes run from 7 to 8pm. All equipment and supplies are provided. If Archery participants have their own bow that they prefer to shoot, they can bring it. If it is suitable, they may use it.

Shotgun Project

There will be an all day Saturday basic shotgun course in September or October. The date is not yet set. If you wish to participate, fill out a 4-H Shooting Sports enrollment form and turn it in to the Extension Office. When the date is set you will get additional information.

There is a \$15 fee for Rifle and a \$10 fee for Archery. Pre-registration is required by contacting the Extension Office and completing a Shooting Sports enrollment form. For questions, call Gene Maggard at 316-742-3746.

What is National 4-H Congress?

National 4-H Congress is a unique leadership opportunity for 4-H members from all 50 states. The event focuses on leadership, youth empowerment, community service, career development, and cultural diversity. The event brings over 1000 4-H members to Atlanta over the Thanksgiving holiday weekend. The planning committee takes advantage of Atlanta's standing as an international city and exposes delegates to as many venues in the city as possible including the Centennial Olympic Park, the World of Coke-A-Cola, CNN Center, Carter Presidential Library and the Martin Luther King Center. 

KANSAS STATE FAIR 4-H PHOTOGRAPHY ID FORM

- 1. FILL OUT THE ABOVE ID FORM, CUT OFF (do not trim edges), AND ATTACH TO THE PHOTO MOUNT BOARD. Use 1" wide masking tape-fold tape around edge of mount; **do not stick tape to front of mount**.
- 2. Place the **State Fair Photography Entry Label** (provided by the State 4-H Office), on the space provided on the PHOTOGRAPHY ID form. This label replaces the State Fair Entry Card. State Fair Entry cards are not used in Photography.
- 3. PHOTOGRAPHY ENTRIES MUST BE MOUNTED ACCORDING TO STATE FAIR RULES. Studio mount board must be used. Use the Photo Display Instructions as a guide for correct photo and ID form placement. Mounting location (1" down from the top and centered on the board).
- 4. CORRECT MOUNTING ADHESIVE MUST BE USED- use only adhesives designed for permanent photography mounting. Do not use rubber cement, or other household glues.
- 5. Remove white border from the enlargement before mounting. Be sure to check the size of the print before mounting. It must not be smaller than 7" x 9" and not larger than 8" x 10".

- Photos improperly mounted (location, size, border not removed, etc.) will have their ribbon placing lowered one place.
- For Class 4805 only--Digital Composite Image Photo must be from an original(s) taken by the exhibitor. Exhibitor must include a second 11" x 12-1/2" mount board mounted with a standard size print(s) of all photos used and 3 x 5 card(s) explaining what manipulation was done. May include additional photos (standard size and may be layered) showing editing steps. Place both matte boards in the same two protective plastic bag.
- 8. Print your name, address and Extension Unit, (County or District Name and County) and location where the photograph was taken on the back of the matte board.
- 9. READ AND FOLLOW THE RULES IN THE STATE FAIR YOUTH PREMIUM BOOK. The rules in the current Premium book will always take priority over any other rules.
