

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Kansas State Youth Livestock Nomination Process 2025 Updates

Use Existing ShoWorks Exhibitor Accounts for Nominations

State Livestock Nominations transitioned to an online system in 2022. Exhibitors who state nominated a market animal or commercial breeding female last year need to use their existing ShoWorks account this year. Do NOT create a new account, unless you truly are a family nominating for the very first time or adding a brand new exhibitor to the family. For help accessing an account, you may use the password reset option or contact the Youth Livestock Programt for assistance. Exhibitors will verify their contact information in ShoWorks from last year, update their age and 2025 YQCA #, then continue through the system.

Remember — all exhibitors who plan to show need their own ShoWorks exhibitor account. Animals must be nominated under each child a family would like to be eligible to enter and exhibit. It is highly encouraged to submit all animals under all kids. Families who have two (2) kids and three (3) animals should enter all three (3) animals under each child's ShoWorks account during nomination. Then, either child may enter and exhibit the animal at a state show.

Order Official DNA Envelopes in Advance

Families will need to purchase official DNA envelopes online through ShoWorks, for each animal in which they plan to nominate. Envelopes that were purchased in 2022 – 2024 are still valid. Old DNA envelopes (2021 and before) will NOT be accepted. The new envelopes include all of the information necessary to enter each animal into the system, as well as provide a place for the barcode sticker, which families need to request from their local extension office. The deadline to order DNA envelopes is 10 days prior to the nomination deadline: Market Beef – April 20; Small Livestock & Commercial Heifers – June 5. There is also an option for expedited shipping. Orders will continue to be filled a few days after the DNA envelope order deadline, but families must pay the \$50 expedited shipping fee to have them overnighted. This is in addition to the cost of each DNA envelope.

* 4-H County and FFA Chapters Available Under Club Drop-down List

Each exhibitor must select the "CLUB" in which they participate and intend to show. For 4-H members, this is their local county. All FFA Chapters have also been added to the system under the county is which they are located. For example, Dickinson county 4-H'ers will select "Dickinson" as their "Club" in the system. An Abilene FFA member will find their chapter under "Dickinson – Abilene FFA". It is vitally important families select the appropriate "Club".

* Use Checkbox Under Market Division for Dual Nominated Females

Exhibitors will continue to have the option to dual nominate gilts, ewes, and does by using a sliding checkbox, under the market division for each specie, rather than entering the information twice (once under both the market and commercial breeding division). Dual nomination means the animal is nominated both in the market division and in the commercial breeding division. Therefore, they are eligible to be entered by an exhibitor and shown in either division for the Grand Drive and/or KJLS. The decision will be made during show entry. Families who wish to take advantage of this option will need to nominate all of their gilts, ewes, and does under the market division, and then move the "Dual Nom (Mkt & Com)" slider button to the blue "YES" on the bottom of the page.

* Kansas State Fair Grand Drive Rule Changes

Continuing this year, all market beef with Maine-Anjou papers will show together in one division – All Maine Breeds. Shorthorn Plus has also been added to the market beef show. The swine show will now include dark and light divisions for both market and commercial breeding. Refer to the 2025 Grand Drive rules for more information.

* KJLS Rule Changes

Limousin steers will show in the AOB division, but families may continue selecting that specific breed in the nomination system. For swine, the birthdate for gilts has been moved to January 1 of the current show year and they will show by weight. The maximum weight for gilts will be 350 pounds, with a 15- pound weigh back. The max number of animals that may be entered for all species is four (4). However, entered animals may be any combination of market and breeding, as long as the number entered per exhibitor does not exceed four (4) total animals. There will be some changes in the KJLS schedule as well. Refer to the 2025 KJLS rules and schedule for additional details.

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2025 Butler County YQCA Information



Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) is a national, multi-species quality assurance program for youth ages 7 to 18. This program promotes food safety, animal well-being and character development. With YQCA, you'll discover what it takes to be an informed producer, consumer and employee of the agriculture and food industries.

YQCA is REQUIRED to be Eligible to Exhibit ALL ANIMAL EXHIBITS (Except Horses) at

the Butler County 4-H Fair.

The YQCA Deadline for Participating in the 2025 Butler County 4-H Fair is <u>May 29th at 11:59 PM, 2025</u>.

Youth are required to take YQCA in-person or online; if taken online, a certificate of completion must be submitted to the Extension Office by May 30th at 11:30 a.m.. You can find more information about YQCA <u>HERE</u>. In person class dates:

• Wednesday, May 28th

** All Classes will be held from 6:00-7:30 p.m. in the Community/4-H (200 N. Griffith, El Dorado)

Frequently Asked YQCA Questions:

Is YQCA mandatory for all 4-H'ers?

YQCA is required to show animals at the Butler County 4-H Fair, the Kansas State Fair, and the Kansas Junior Livestock Show. 8-18 yr. olds must pass a web based or instructor led training.

7 year olds must attend an instructor led course.

• How much does getting certified cost?

The online module certification is \$12, and the instructor-led training method of certification is \$3.

- Does the YQCA certification ID sync with 4-H online?
 - Yes, you will sign in using your 4-H Online information.
- I only show horses. Do I need to be YQCA certified?
- No. Right now, YQCA, is not required for 4-H Horse Project Members.

 Do 4-H'ers need to update their YQCA certification number each year?
 - Yes they do. Youth should re-certify around the same time they tested each year.
- Do I need to register before class?
 - Yes! You must register and pay online before attending an instructor-led class. You will also need to take the pre-test before class.
- Does Butler County 4-H get the registration money?
 No, all registration money is online and goes to YQCA.



2025 Horse Project

The Kansas 4-H Horse ID Certificate (P1039) has been updated for the 2025 4-H program year. Beginning with the 2025 4-H program year, please use the new form and destroy previously used 4-H Horse ID Certificates. As a reminder, to properly identify your horse, complete the 4-H Horse ID Certificate, have your Extension Agent sign it and copy it. A COPY of the Horse ID Certificate is kept on file in the Extension Office and the 4-H Horse member maintains the ORIGINAL certificate. The original certificate is presented by the 4-H member to show staff for check-in at the local 4-H horse shows. Beginning in 2025, registration papers WILL NOT be accepted to identify horses for the 4-H Horse project. An example of the Horse ID Certificate is available online.



Additionally, the <u>4-H Horse Show Rulebook (S133)</u> has been revised and is now available. Supplemental educational materials will also be released throughout the year to assist 4-H members, leaders and Extension staff with the 4-H Horse program.



Coggins Now Required for Horse Project



The Kansas Department of Animal Health released an update to <u>Kansas Animal Health Regulations in its Spring 2025 newsletter</u>. This has resulted in many questions from local staff, project leaders and fairboards regarding the requirement of a negative EIA test for local events

• <u>KAR 9-7-14</u> establishes the requirement of a negative **EIA test** (Coggins) for horses that are changing ownership or are used for exhibition purposes which must be completed in the previous 12 months. This requirement includes horses that originate outside the state of Kansas **or from within** the state of Kansas.

From the Kansas Department of Animal Health: *K.A.R.* 9-7-14

(2) "Exhibition" shall mean the commingling of animals for the purpose of showing or judging contest or any other type of public display, equidae used for team roping, penning, barrel racing, rodeo, or other performance events. (Authorized by K.S.A. 47-607d and 47-610; implementing K.S.A. 47-610; effective, E-76-28, Aug. 15, 1975; effective May 1, 1976; amended Jan. 23, 1998; amended Jan. 3, 2025.

What is a Coggins test?

• 'Coggins' is a common name for a blood test that is used to screen horses, mules and donkeys for a possibly fatal disease - Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA).

What is Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA)?

- EIA is an infectious, and potentially even deadly, virus that affects the immune system of animals in the equidae family.
- While some animals are able to carry the virus without showing symptoms, other horses will suffer from very severe symptoms of the disease including irregular heartbeats, swollen legs and abdomen, general weakness, anemia, a high fever and even sudden death.
- A herd outbreak of EIA can lead to catastrophic consequences which is why it is essential for horse owners to be diligent about testing for the disease.

How can my horse catch EIA?

- EIA is transmitted from one horse to another through mosquito bites, horse flies, deer flies or stable flies that have fed on a different infected animal. This means that your horse does not even need to have come into direct contact with an infected animal in order to contract this disease.
- Because flies are attracted to barns and other places that horses frequent, this extremely serious disease can be quickly and easily transmitted from one horse to another.

Where/How is a Coggins test performed?

• A veterinarian conducts a thorough exam of the horse and performs a blood draw. The blood is submitted to an accredited laboratory.

Once the analysis is complete, the lab will forwards the results either directly to the owner, and/or to your veterinarian. Some veterinary clinics use digital Coggins testing technology. This means that the results of the test will be visible online, but can be printed.

Why is Coggins testing important and who should be testing?

• EIA is highly contagious and fatal. Responsible horse owners should test annually, especially if horses will be comingled with other horses.

4-H Scholarship **Opportunities**

Did you know that the Butler County 4-H Council has event scholarships available to all Butler County 4-H members?!

Scholarship Requirements:

- Any current 4-H member (includes Coverbuds) is eligible to apply for a scholarship.
- 4-H'ers are limited to 2 event scholarships per 4-H year.
- Completed forms are to be submitted to the Butler County Extension Office with event payment prior to event registration deadline.



Scholarship Details:

- If you did not submit a KAP and pin application or did not receive a pin within the past year for a \$100 scholarship
- Submitted a KAP and received a pin within the past year for a \$200 scholarship. Those that have already received their 10-year pin are exempt from pin requirement.

HPAI:

Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza

Highly pathogenic avian influenza, or HPAI, is a rapidly spreading viral disease that can infect many types of birds. Avian influenza, often called avian flu or bird flu, can be common, but some strains are highly pathogenic, which means they are more deadly. Introduced by migrating wild birds, HPAI can spread through spring migration and affect all domestic poultry — small and backyard flocks as well as commercial industries.

Poultry with HPAI do not survive the illness. Vaccines for HPAI are not readily available.

Signs of Avian Influenza

- · Coughing and sneezing
- · Difficulty breathing
- Extreme depression
- · Lack of energy
- · Decrease in feed or water intake

- Swelling or purple discoloration of head, eyelids, comb, wattle and legs
- · Decrease in egg production
- Sudden unexplained death

Biosecurity is your best option to prevent HPAI from entering your small or backyard poultry flock.

Here is what you can do:

Protect Your Small Flock from Avian Influenza



Limit or halt travel with your birds to sales, shows and swaps.

Ensure you have clean hands, clothes, and footwear before handling your birds if you attend events. Do not allow others to handle your birds.



3 Limit your birds' visitors.
If someone must visit your birds: discuss where they have been. Have them wash their hands and wear clean clothes and footwear.







Call your veterinarian if your flock shows signs of influenza or you suspect exposure. No veterinarian? Call the Kansas Department of Agriculture's Division of Animal Health at 785-564-6601.

- Trailers may arrive beginning at Noon Saturday
- Registration opens at 6:00 a.m. Sunday
- Swine checked-in by 8:00 a.m. (Show at 9:00 a.m.)
- Sheep & Goats checked-in by 10:30 a.m. (Sheep show 11am or 30 min after swine show. Goat show 15 min after completion of sheep show)

RULES AND REGULATIONS

- Butler County Black Gold Committee, Butler County 4-H, Butler County Extension Council, and the Butler County Fair Board are not responsible for any accidents.
- 2. Open to all current 4-H/FFA members 18 years and younger as of January 1, 2025. Out of State exhibitors are welcome!
- 3. All males must be castrated.
- All animals must be owned and shown by the exhibitor & free of clinical signs of infestations or contagious diseases, infections and sickness.
- 5. Only one animal per exhibitor in Butler County classes.
- 6. NO bedding allowed in the barns.
- 7. Show from your trailer. A \$50 deposit/pen will be required the day of the show if you wish to stall in the barn. The deposit will be returned upon inspection of the designated pen being cleaned.
- 8. Watch Facebook for updates.
- 9. Declare your own weight by respective registration close times.
- 10. The show committee reserves the right to resolve all questions not covered in the rules, request to see registration papers, a weigh back, etc. and their decision is final.
- 11. Full fit for show for anyone who wants to fit!

PROSPECT SWINE

- Prospect market animals may be either sex. Barrows and Gilts will show together.
- 2. Prospect market animals will show by breed but must have a minimum of 5 to make a breed class or will show as AOB.

PROSPECT SHEEP & MEAT GOATS

- NEW Does and ewes must be less than 2 years of age.
- Prospect market animals may be either sex. Must have milk teeth.
- 3. Exhibitors may brace animals, but all four feet must be on the ground. Show director has the right to disqualify any violators.
- All market and breeding animals will be shown by weight. There will be no breed classes
- 5. Market may not be shown in breeding and vice versa
