
Volunteers

North Butler 4-H Family Hosts Student Thru State's 4-H International Exchange Program

This past July and August 2025, our family hosted a Japanese student through the States' 4-H International Exchange Program. The States' 4-H International Exchange Program allows students from Japan, as well as several other countries, come to the United States to learn about American culture and 4-H. The primary contact for Kansas is Pamela Van Horn. She works for Kansas State University and works with contacts in Japan to bring both male and female students to Kansas that are between the ages of 12-17. The students that are selected to come to Kansas participate in a similar "club" experience in Japan learning English, as well as other languages and cultures.

We chose to host a 14-year-old girl named Rinka from Tokyo, Japan. She was in-between the ages of our two girls, Ella and Julia. After looking at her interests, we thought she would be a



In late June, we found out that Rinka would be staying with us. We picked her up at Rock Springs 4-H Camp the day after the fair and brought her to our house for 3 ½ weeks. She had been to Kansas City last summer with the same exchange program, but had never stayed with a family in the country before. We tried to teach her all we knew about rural life, Kansas and 4-H. At the beginning, Rinka did not speak English very well so thank goodness for Google Translate! (She understood more than she could speak). By the end of the last week, she was able to speak 2–3-word sentences in English.



Rinka learned about our 4-H projects, including our cattle and horses, crafts, woodworking, photography, and foods. She was nervous to pet our dogs and cats, let alone the cattle and horses, as she did not have pets in the big city of Tokyo. Rinka got to experience a cattle round up in the Flint Hills (riding along in the truck) and we taught her about local crops such as corn and soybeans. We took her to my cousin's wedding, my nephews' birthday parties, went swimming in several pools and lakes, enjoyed country walks, and took her camping. We took her to church, shared our favorite foods, made tie dye shirts, baked nobake and chocolate chip cookies, and played lots of games. The girls had fun going school supply shopping with Rinka and took her to "Back to School" night. Rinka visited Julia's middle school on

the second day of school for a few hours to experience music class and saw Ella's high school as well.

Gift giving is a big tradition to Japanese culture. Rinka brought several gifts with her to give our family including Japanese candy and ramen noodles. We learned other things from her such as how to write our names in Japanese, some Japanese words, how to fold origami and how to fit and wear a kimono. Ella was able to share these experiences with Rinka's help at our August 4-H club meeting and encouraged other 4-Her's to host next year.





We have continued to keep in touch with Rinka and her family though email. It is neat to know a friend on the other side of the world. The biggest lesson we gained from this experience is that a smile goes a long way and even if you speak a different language, you can still connect to others though similar interests. 4-H Scholarship Opportunities

Did you know that the Butler County 4-H Council has event scholarships available to all Butler County 4-H members?!

Scholarship Requirements:

- Any current 4-H member (includes Coverbuds) is eligible to apply for a scholarship.
- 4-H'ers are limited to 2 event scholarships per 4-H year.
- Completed forms are to be submitted to the Butler County Extension Office with event payment prior to event registration deadline.



Scholarship Details:

- If you did not submit a KAP and pin application *or* did not receive a pin within the past year for a \$100 scholarship
- Submitted a KAP and received a pin within the past year for a \$200 scholarship. Those that have already received their 10-year pin are exempt from pin requirement.

Kansas 4-H gears up for weekend of community service Oct. 11-12

'48 Hours of 4-H' caps National 4-H Week in the U.S.

MANHATTAN, Kan. -- <u>Kansas 4-H</u> will celebrate its long-standing commitment to community service when members across the state participate in <u>48 Hours of 4-H</u>, Oct. 11-12.

Beth Hinshaw, a regional 4-H youth development specialist, said the 13th annual event wraps up <u>National 4-H</u> Week in the United States.

"In our (4-H) pledge, we say we commit our hands to larger service to my club, community and world," Hinshaw said. "48 Hours of 4-H helps fulfill the pledge that 4-H members make every time they meet together."

48 Hours of 4-H is a project that encourages clubs in the state to plan a community service project. "It's not a 48 hour project," Hinshaw said, "but rather a project that you do sometime during that 48 hour timeframe."

"We want the service to be meaningful and we want it to make a difference in their community," she added. "It's all about celebrating the impact Kansas 4-H'ers are making in their communities—and the volunteers, leaders, and mentors helping us grow. From leading service projects to lending a helping hand, we're showing what it means to be #4HBeyondReady."

In the past, Hinshaw said, groups have been very creative in how they have chosen to help their community, including such things as:

- Beautification of the community, such as painting equipment in parks, planting flower bulbs, picking up trash and trimming landscapes.
- Collections, such as non-perishable foods, pet foods and laundry supplies.
- Special events.
- Serving meals.
- Visiting nursing homes.

"They've found something to do that will make a difference in the community where they live," Hinshaw said. "Some groups have long-time partners that they work with; for example, one local unit helps with a Halloween Walk most years. But there are a lot of new projects, also."

In addition to asking local media to cover their project, Hinshaw urges Kansas 4-H clubs to post pictures to Instagram, Facebook and Instagram with the hashtag, #484H and #4HBeyondReady

More information about 48 Hours of 4-H and how to register a project is available online.

Hinshaw also noted that the new 4-H year began Oct. 1, noting that 48 Hours of 4-H is often an opportunity for those considering membership to see what 4-H is all about. More information about 4-H, including how to get involved, is available online, and from local extension offices in Kansas.

It All Started With Lego

From Lego to Manufacturing: One Engineer's Journey

"As a young kid, I was always into building things and Lego blocks were a huge part of that," said Jonathan McPherson, director of advanced manufacturing research and training at K-State Olathe. "Then, when I was in fifth grade, my mom said I should think about becoming an engineer and somewhere, there's a quote from me in a yearbook saying that I'm going to become a mechanical engineer."

McPherson's mom was right. Now, he leads K-State Olathe's Advanced Manufacturing and Bulk Solids Technology Center, fulfilling the promise he made in his yearbook. The center provides in-demand training opportunities for professionals in the manufacturing industry throughout North America, as well as research and analysis on bulk solids.



But for McPherson, like many young engineers, the journey started years before he entered the business world.

"I've always been fortunate because I knew what I wanted to do," McPherson said. "That desire to be an engineer followed me throughout high school and to college. I hadn't necessarily considered getting involved in manufacturing, but life kept leading me in that direction."

Originally, McPherson planned to design heavy equipment, such as bulldozers. Then he met someone at a career fair who changed the trajectory of his engineering career.

"They explained what the world of engineering was all about, invited me for an interview, and one thing led to another. That was my first job out of college."

McPherson's first engineering position really taught him what the worlds of engineering and manufacturing are all about: people who are passionate about the things they create.

"I also remember, in that experience, meeting some of the people I was going to be working with. I just knew this is the industry I wanted to be in, and these were the people I wanted to work with. Everyone was so down-to-Earth."

One of the most important parts of McPherson's first position was traveling throughout the United States. He had the opportunity to travel to a variety of manufacturing sites and plants.

"Each one was different," McPherson said. "One plant made additives, one made lunch meat, one made snack food. I saw this huge range, and along the way, I started meeting and connecting with great people."



It All Started With Lego

It's the people that who make manufacturing such a wonderful industry to work in, according to McPherson.

"A lot happens behind the scenes that people don't always think about with manufacturing," he said. "You don't think about purchasing agents, HR staff, people who transport raw materials or finished goods, leadership or maintenance."

Now, team members who work in a variety of positions have the opportunity to work with K-State Olathe at our Advanced Manufacturing and Bulk Solids Technology Center.

Of course, McPherson also has a message for anyone who wants to go into engineering or manufacturing.

"This type of work is right for anyone who wants to work with their hands or is very technical. Somebody who is good at organizing might also do well, somebody who is passionate, somebody who has a desire for leadership."

McPherson also shared that there is a lot of pride manufacturing, especially having the opportunity to say that you made something in your local community.

"When you walk into a plant and talk to people, generally, everyone is very proud of what they're a part of, and with good reason. Most people in manufacturing also are very dedicated. It's not uncommon for someone to spend most or all of their career at a particular site."

Of course, McPherson also shared encouragement for learners who may be considering a career in engineering but who may have some misconceptions about how to get started.

"People always say, 'You're an engineer. You must be good at math!' I'm not. Don't let anyone tell you that you have to be good at math or chemistry or physics to be good and make it in this world. If you're good at building things — whether that be a treehouse or a marketing program — you can be successful in manufacturing."

Of course, we also asked McPherson what he likes most about this industry.

His answer?

"There's a lot of satisfaction and pride in building something. This feels overly poetic, but I legitimately believe that manufacturing strengthens communities, and being part of that is, well, it's very rewarding."

HPAI:

Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza

Highly pathogenic avian influenza, or HPAI, is a rapidly spreading viral disease that can infect many types of birds. Avian influenza, often called avian flu or bird flu, can be common, but some strains are highly pathogenic, which means they are more deadly. Introduced by migrating wild birds, HPAI can spread through spring migration and affect all domestic poultry — small and backyard flocks as well as commercial industries.

Poultry with HPAI do not survive the illness. Vaccines for HPAI are not readily available.

Signs of Avian Influenza

- · Coughing and sneezing
- · Difficulty breathing
- · Extreme depression
- · Lack of energy
- Decrease in feed or water intake

- Swelling or purple discoloration of head, eyelids, comb, wattle and legs
- · Decrease in egg production
- Sudden unexplained death

Biosecurity is your best option to prevent HPAI from entering your small or backyard poultry flock.

Here is what you can do:

Protect Your Small Flock from Avian Influenza



Limit or halt travel with your birds to sales, shows and swaps.

Ensure you have clean hands, clothes, and footwear before handling your birds if you attend events. Do not allow others to handle your birds.



3 Limit your birds' visitors.
If someone must visit your birds: discuss where they have been. Have them wash their hands and wear clean clothes and footwear.
