2023 Kansas State Fair Information

Dairy Exhibitors:

- Entries are not done through the Extension Office this year, they are all online through the Kansas State Fair.
- □ You can find the information in the Kansas State Fair Handbook, pages 97-100. The Kansas State Fair open class information and registration can be found <u>HERE</u>

Volunteer Information:

If you would like to volunteer at the Kansas State Fair, please call the Extension Office to see where the needs are the greatest. This will also include the option to help with Centennial Hall set up on August 30th. Each volunteer will receive an admission ticket once the Fair has started.

Ticket Ordering:

- □ We will be ordering additional 4-H State Fair Tickets if you would like to purchase them. Please note that each static exhibitor will receive two free tickets in lieu of premium money.
- Adult Gate Tickets are \$7 and Youth Gate Tickets are \$3. There will be a \$2 handling fee for all ticket orders; this fee is per order, NOT per ticket. Tickets must be ordered by 5:00 PM on Friday, August 4th. Orders and money for the tickets will need to be paid by 5:00 PM on Friday, August 4th. Cash or checks only. Checks will need to be made payable to: Butler County 4-H.

Entry Information:

- □ The Butler County Extension Office will be accepting Kansas State Fair Entries through 5:00 PM on August 4th.
- Delease read the General and Division rules in the State Fair Book. You can find a link to that HERE
 - *To be eligible for State Fair entry you must* 1) Be 9 years old 4-H age and 2) Receive a purple ribbon at the Butler County Fair 3) Receive a purple ribbon at 4-H Days with a public presentation.
 - Division rules will detail any labeling and forms required for exhibits. Please read this carefully as accurate forms and labeling are the responsibility of exhibitors.
- Complete the <u>entry collection form</u> for your entries. Please make sure that you have all fields as required on the second page.
 - You can log into 4-HOnline to check each 4-Her's years in project. You can print this form and drop it off during office hours, mail it to our office, or attach it to an email. If you choose email, please send to both cmmiller1@ksu.edu and aemclaughlin@ksu.edu.
- □ Exhibitors will receive two free entry tickets per exhibitor in lieu of premiums. We will order these and notify exhibitors when they are available for pickup.
- □ Entries (small, non-breathing items) may be dropped off at the 4-H Building on September 6th from *3:00 6:00 p.m. ONLY*. Further instructions about entry preparation for transit will be sent to exhibitors.
- Please note that some divisions, such as Fashion Revue and Visual Arts, only allow a certain number of entries per county. Those entries are preselected and eligible 4-H'ers have been notified.



Hunters Education

2023 Hunter Education Course

The Hunter Education courses are open to anyone. No fee is required. No one under the age of 11 will be certified in Hunter Education. Those under age 11 may take the course with special permission from the instructor. Anyone taking the Hunter Education courses prior to age 11, will be required to take the course again for certification after turning 11. All courses are being held at the Butler County 4- H Community Building located at 200 N. Griffith in El Dorado. Call the Butler County Extension Office at 316-321-9660 to pre-enroll! Enrollment is limited, so call early! No Drop-Ins Will Be Accepted.

Pre-enrollment is required for all courses



Internet Assisted Courses: August 12th & September 16th, 2023

Check-in: 7:30-8:00 AM

Field Day: 8:00 AM - 3:30 PM

Lunch: 11 :30 AM - 12:30 PM

You will need to have access to a computer and a printer in order to complete the online portion of an Internet-Assisted course. This independent study method requires pre-registration in an Internet-assisted Field Day and Testing Session and completion of the Kansas online hunter education course. DO NOT TAKE THE ONLINE COURSE UNTIL YOU HAVE PRE-REGISTERED FOR THE INTERNET-ASSISTED HUNTER EDUCATION FIELD DAY AND TESTING SESSION OF YOUR CHOICE.

Field Day Instructions:

- Pre enroll for the field day at the Butler County Extension Office by August 9th (for the Aug. 12th course) or September 13th (for the Sept. 16th course)
- 2. Go to the Kansas Wildlife, Parks & Tourism website at ksoutdoors.com
- Follow the prompts to access the on-line test and complete it. Education - Hunter Education - Internet Assisted Course - Free Kansas Internet Assisted Course (Yellow box at the bottom of the page) - take the test.



4. After completing the test, print the completion certificate and bring it with you to the field day.



Butler County Fair Thank You's

Fair is over and the dust has settled. The Fair takes a plethora of volunteers and support from buyers to make it successful. Have you sent your Thank You notes? Do you know who to send Thank You notes too? Here is a list of suggestions that we strongly encourage you to write a note of Thanks. Without the support of these individuals, the Fair would not be as successful as it is:

- Food Buyers (we will have a list available of those who purchased food). Even if you don't know who bought your food – you are encouraged to pick out 4 or 5 random names and write notes of Thanks. DID YOU KNOW – the food auction helps support scholarships for you to attend 4-H Camp and other activities?
- Livestock Buyers You are required to get the buyers signature on a card if you wish to participate in next year's event. How many of you went out into the crowd, found the buyer of your animal and said THANK YOU immediately following your animal exiting the sale ring and/or even offered to get them a drink? Our buyers are our heart and souls. Without them, the premiums won't be there. Did you have an add-on (you will know when you pick up your buyer's card)? If so, you need to write a Thank You to them as well. If you need addresses, please contact our office we can help you out. We will let everyone know as soon as the buyers cards are available to be picked up.
- Fair Board There is a lot that goes on behind the scenes getting everything ready for the Fair, A LOT: scheduling, awards, organizing set-up and clean-up, sponsors and everything in between!
- Superintendent's I encourage you to write a Thank You note to the Superintendent's of the Division's you participated in. Volunteers are a critical aspect of the Butler County Fair.
- The Extension Office staff and The Extension Board
 – these individuals work year round to help the 4-H'ers out.
- Auctioneers Our auctioneers from Sundgren Realty Inc. Land & Real Estate Brokers do a fabulous job getting the most they can for the youth and the projects. We need to let them know our Thanks!
- Judges Why not write a letter to the judge and thank them for helping out, even if you aren't happy about your placing! Without judges, we wouldn't have a Fair!
- Project Leaders and Community Leaders need I say more?
- Butler County Board of County Commissioners they support our program. We need to let them know just how much we appreciate their support.



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Youth Program Quality Principles

Dedicated volunteers and staff spend many hours working directly with youth in 4-H programs. From exploring topics in a Cloverbuds program, to learning science skills by building a robot, to attending National 4-H Congress, 4-H provides many different types of programs to meet the needs of youth as they grow and develop. What happens in 4-H programs, how they are planned and led, makes a huge difference in the impact of the program on youth! In order to have the biggest impact, programs need to adhere to eight critical principles of program quality:

- 1. Physical and psychological safety Youth need to feel safe in 4-H programs and be able to interact positively with others.
- 2. Appropriate structure Whether it is a club meeting or leadership camp, 4-H programs must have clear and consistent rules and expectations, with clear boundaries and age-appropriate monitoring.
- **3.** Supportive relationships All youth need to feel warmth from and closeness to others in 4-H. Youth need to feel others care about and support them. They also need to receive clear guidance and communication from 4-H volunteers and staff.
- **4. Opportunities to belong** All youth need to feel included in a meaningful way in 4-H, regardless of their gender, ethnicity, sexual orientations, or ability. Youth should have opportunities to share their culture and heritage with others and to forge a positive identify.
- 5. Positive social norms Youth should experience clear rules and expectations for participating in 4-H, including the values, morals, and ethical expectations of being a 4-H member.
- 6. Support for efficacy and mattering Youth in 4-H should be taken seriously and respected for their ideas and contributions. Youth should be



given opportunities to develop responsibility and be challenged to set and achieve goals.


- 7. Opportunities for skill building Youth need to develop physical, psychological, intellectual, emotional and social skills as they grow and develop. 4-H provides opportunities for youth to develop these skills, skills that support a young person into adulthood and the workplace.
- 8. Integration of family, school and community Youth in 4-H do best when there is a connection to their 4-H experience with their family, school, and community. This is why 4-H programs begin at the local level, in the community where youth can practice their emerging leadership skills as they grow and develop.
