- □ New 4-H Year starts Oct. 1st: All youth participating between Oct. 1, 2023 and Sept 30, 2024 need to enroll (including shooting sports youth). Any enrollment prior to Oct. 1, 2023 needs to reenroll.
- State 4-H Projects—there have been some changes!! Please check the 4-H Project page and watch enrollment carefully!! Make sure your 4-H'er gets enrolled in the right projects.
- Clubs and Projects will not automatically populate when you reenroll. You will have to select your club and all projects you want to enroll in. Years in project are supposed to automatically populate when you reenroll in a project you were enrolled in the previous year.
 - ⇒ If you have projects that you previously enrolled in, did not enroll in the 2022-2023 year, but are reenrolling for the new year and need to know your 4-Her's years in the project please give us a call and we can look up the years for you.

- Club Leader
- Local K-State Research and Extension staff

TIME COMMITMENT:

1-year term, October to September. Project meetings should be held at a time, place and frequency that is determined by you and the 4-Hers.

QUALIFICATIONS:

- Interest in helping youth.
- Interest in 4-H educational programs.
- Knowledge in or willingness to learn about subject matter to be lead (taught).
- Ability to organize and coordinate.
- Ability to communicate with youth and adults.

PURPOSE:

Provide leadership/teaching in a specific subject matter area to a small group of 4-Hers and assist them to develop life skills.

RESPONSIBILITIES:

All individuals who work directly with youth are required to complete the Kansas 4-H volunteer screening process. Organize the project group. Communicate with 4-H members and families. Schedule and arrange for the project meetings. Conduct/teach project meetings. Help members complete project exhibit(s). Help members complete project report forms. Attend club meetings when possible.

Youth Council National Conference Applications

The <u>Youth Council Application</u> and <u>National Conference</u> <u>Application</u> will be combined this year, with applicants indicating if they are applying for one or both opportunities.

Any Kansas 4-H member ages of 14-18 before January 1, 2024 may apply as a Council Rep and those 15-18 before January 1, 2024 may apply for National Conference.

This year's KYLF delegation will elect representatives from the four extension program areas (NE, NW, SE, SW) for one year terms on council. Up to 6 National Conference Delegates will be selected through an interview process at KYLF and they serve a two year term on council. The deadline for applications will be October 2nd, 2023.

Kansas Youth Leadership Forum

The Kansas Youth Leadership Forum (KYLF) is planned for November 18-19, 2023 at Rock Springs 4-H Center. KYLF is for youth ages 14-18 before January 1, 2024. KYLF will feature leadership workshops, Youth Council Elections, and opportunities to learn and have fun. We also will plan for an option for coming in Friday evening and having breakfast Saturday morning for those coming from a distance.

Parliamentary Basics

Did you know that Parliamentary procedure is an orderly way to conduct a meeting, a fair way to make a group discussion, respects everyone, gives everyone a chance to speak, used in groups everywhere, and majority rules while minorities are protected....

The proper way to make a motion is to say "I move..". The proper way to second a motion is to say "I second the motion."

If you want to amend (change) a motion you should say "I move to amend the motion by...."

A motion to adjourn the meeting is done so by stating "I move to adjourn this meeting." A motion to adjourn needs a second, no discussion needed, and must be voted on right away!

Did you know there are over 30 different types of motions! These are some simple ones and the majority of the ones that you will utilize in your 4-H Club meeting.

Remember, STAND UP when you are speaking and only one person speaks at a time!

Welcoming New Families



It is the time of year when our office starts getting more calls and web inquiries of people wanting to join 4-H. When you have visitors, remember, impressions last. Here are a few helpful tips for you:

- Greet your visitors at the door when they arrive.
- □ Introduce them to your family and other 4-H members.
- □ Tell them about the opening ceremony of your club so they know what to expect and give them a copy of the 4-H Pledge to follow along.
- □ Introduce them to the club. You can do this during roll call. If they are joining another club member, have that club member help

introduce them.

- □ Involve them in the recreation activities.

 - □ After the meeting, send a Thank You note for attending and invite them to the next meeting.
 - □ Have a New Family Coordinator who can sit next to them at meetings and answer any questions they have.

 4-H family who can help explain and understand 4-H.

Creative Ideas

To add zest to your meeting

Dress Silly Day:

One meeting could be jazzed up by a dress theme. Members can create costumes from their clothing at home. You can have a mismatched day, green day, hat day, pajamas day, crazy shoe day, tie day, sunglasses day, backwards clothing day and dress as your parents day. These are just some examples. Have the club help you create more, or add more yourself.

Backwards Meeting:

Start the meeting with the motion for adjournment and go from there! The entire meeting is backwards. Members and parents might even want to dress backwards. Talk about really learning the meeting order; this will do it!

Draw Your Name Out of a Hat Day:

Cut up the order of the club meeting. Place the slips of paper in a hat. Draw out a slip of paper. That is the first item of the meeting. Continue until every item has been drawn out of the hat. This should make for a most interesting meeting!

Move To a New Seat During a Meeting:

This is another seating adventure. The President could give the command. "Move two seats to your left." "Rows one and two switch seats." "End seats switch with each other." The command can be different each time. The club members will definitely be paying attention to the meeting to hear where they need to move next.
