☐ Two Primary OWBs in Kansas

- Caucasion bluestem (Bothriochloa bladhii)
 - Warm season perennial grass native to subtropical Asia and Africa
- Yellow Bluestem (Bothriochloa ischaemum)
 - Warm season perennial from southern Europe and Asia

(Both introduced into the United States in the early 1900's)

□ Caucasion Bluestem

- Small blue-gray graceful grass, with flowering stems that can reach one to three feet high
- Forms dense tufts of blue-green smooth leaf blades up to 12 inches long and less than a ¼ inch wide with a thickened mid-vein
- Nodes are purple-tinged and may be smooth or with short hairs

☐Yellow Bluestem

- Larger than Caucasian bluestem, and has yellow-green leaves that are usually smooth
- Sheaths are rounded and blades are flat or folded
- Nodes may be smooth or with short hairs
