What is KSRE/Butler County?

K-State Research and Extension/Butler County is your connection to the Land Grant University. Our role is to provide research based education to the residents of Butler County. We are a cooperative effort between the U.S. Department of Ag, Kansas State University, and Butler County.

In 1862, Congress created the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the land-grant universities. In 1914 the Cooperative Extension Service was added.

The county extension council is a legally constituted part of the Cooperative Extension Service and, through it, a part of Kansas State University.

David came to Butler County in 1980 in the 4-H position after serving in that position in Douglas and Cherokee counties. In 1994, he moved to the Agriculture agent position and assumed Director responsibilities in 2003.
